

Adding photos when you don't have any

Letâ??s look at a few possible solutions for this issue.

It might not be of the correct time period but since the most important part of the layout is the story, the photo will only be an accent.

Take a new picture

If that cabin is still standing and is within a reasonable distance, maybe you can still go over and take a picture of it now. Even though it is going to be a nice, crisp photo, you can always make it look like it is an old one using the **Time Machine** effects in Paintshop Pro. Again, the focus will be on the story anyways.

Use a partial photo

If you are relating a story that is taking place at the river, maybe you have another photo taken around the same place but for a totally different occasion, with totally different people. You can use a section of the photo showing the river and nobody will know that it is completely unrelated to the story. After all,

it might still be the same river. And what if it is another river? Again, it might not matter much at all since this photo becomes simply an embellishment to the story, which is the most important part of the page.

Find stock photography

Some sites offer a large variety of free stock photography. You might obviously not find the exact photo of that log cabin you went to, but maybe another log cabin can do the trick. Again, the photo becomes justian accessory and not the main focus. Morguefile is a good resource for stock photography, and so are thoseless and pilotics.

Illustrate a detail from the story

You might remember an event that took place while driving, or on vacation. You can look for a photo of an empty road. It could be anywhere. Or if there is a mention of a chipmunk that you fed peanuts every day, you can find a photo of a peanut, even though the star of the story would be the animal.

Use embellishments on the theme

Even if you dona?? It have an actual photo of the location, the event or the people, you might find that many themed kits include decorative elements that can be used to emphasize the theme of the story. If you are talking about the time you got lost in the woods, maybe you can find a tree element. If you are relating a story about the pool, you might have a pool toy among the embellishment. Look through your stash. You might have just that little element to use on that photo-less layout.

Since many stories might take place in the past and some photos you may find are more recent, you can always make them look older using a variety of techniques to add age, stains, rips, tears and such distressed details.
