

Using Adjustment Layers

Description

Among the various layers available to PaintShop Pro users, you will find Adjustment Layers. Unlike Vector and Raster layers, the **Adjustment layers** won't show anything directly but will act as a mask in applying various effects to the layers below.

What is an Adjustment Layer?


An adjustment layer will be a layer in greyscale that is visible in the **Layers** palette. On their own, **Adjustment layers** don't show anything, but they are associated with various other settings. For example, you can have a **Brightness/Contrast Adjustment Layer** or a **Channel Mixer Adjustment Layer**. Each of the multiple options will behave just like their counterpart (the **Brightness/Contrast** and **Channel Mixer** settings) but will not be applied directly onto the active layer. Instead, the effect will be applied through that additional layer, a little like a window letting the light through.

Why use an Adjustment Layer?

Using the various settings on a layer will modify that layer permanently and the adjustments cannot be modified later. On the other hand, applying the same settings through an **Adjustment Layer** will not affect the original layer itself. This means that the **Adjustment Layer** can be modified or even deleted if needed, later in the process, without having to undo a dozen or a hundred steps.


How to use an Adjustment Layer?

You can find the various **Adjustment Layers** under the **Layers** menu.




Earlier versions of PaintShop Pro have fewer.

Once you chose an **Adjustment Layer** from the list, you will get a dialog window that is identical to the similar tool used separately. For example, when adding a **Brightness/Contrast Adjustment Layer**, you will get this window:




On this window, you can select the levels of **Brightness** and **Contrast** that you want. Remember that since it is an **Adjustment Layer**, you will be able to change those settings later.

In the **Layers** palette, you will now see a white layer, by default, meaning that the settings you have just chosen are now applied to the whole surface of the layer. This layer can now be modified with various tools to replace the white with greys and black. On the other hand, you can fill this whole layer with black and gradually add greys and white. Overall, wherever this layer will be black, the effect won't be applied to the layers below. Where there is white, the effect will be applied to the maximum, and then, every grey area will apply the adjustment based on that level of grey.



And this **Adjustment Layer** will give this result:



Adjustment Layers in a group

The effect of the **Adjustment Layer** will be applied to ALL the layers below its position in the **Layers** palette. However, sometimes, you want to apply a particular adjustment to only one layer. Maybe you want to adjust its brightness or its color to match the rest of the project. If that is the case, the best

option is to add the Adjustment Layer in a group, with only that layer you want to modify.

To add an **Adjustment Layer** in a group, create a layer group with the target layer, and then add the **Adjustment Layer** to it. If you have already worked with the **Adjustment Layer** and changed your mind, you can always create the group and slide the layer in the group.
