

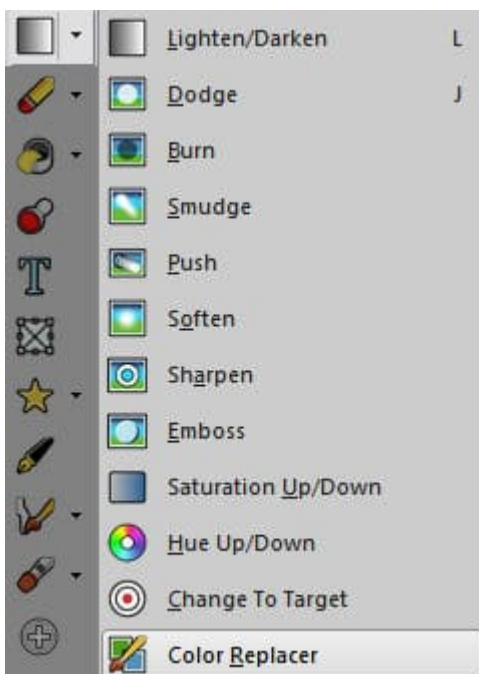
## The Color Replacer tool

### Description

If you want to change the color of an element in a design, the **Color Replacer** tool might be just what you need. Let's have a look at that tool and how you can use it.

### Where is the Color Replacer tool?

By default, that tool might not be obvious because it does not show in the **Tools** toolbar initially. You have to click the arrow beside the **Lighten/Darken** tool to see it appear at the bottom of the list.



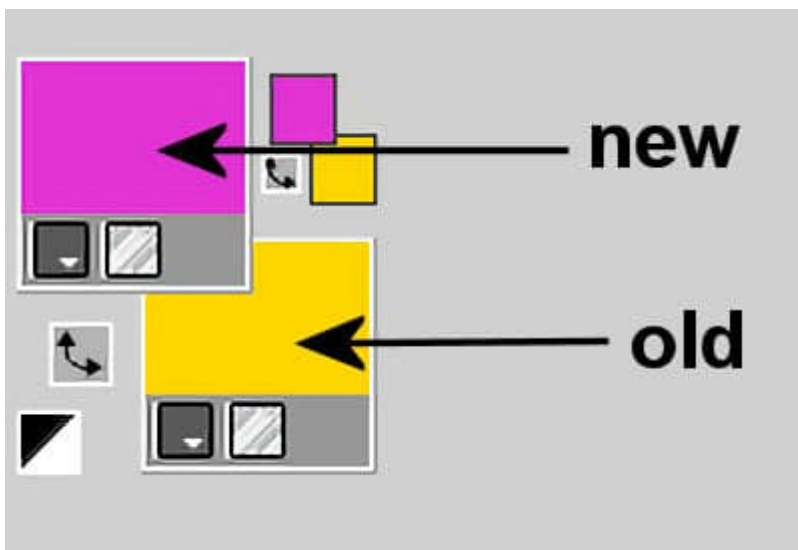

## What does the Color Replacer tool do?

As its name implies, the **Color Replacer** is meant to replace a color with another one. Because it will use one color as a replacement, it will work best on drawings and images and not so well on photographs.

## How does the Color Replacer tool work?

The **Color Replacer** tool will use the two color swatches in the **Materials** palette. The **Foreground** color will be the new color you want to apply, while the **Background** color is what you want to replace.



Let's take this particular design of a toy train.



With the colors set above, it will replace the yellow with pink, wherever I will brush. I can replace the color in some areas only, if I want.



Or everywhere, if I brush everywhere.



Notice that it did not replace all the yellow areas. If you look at the initial image, you can see that the areas were different shades of yellow. Among the settings for that tool is the **Tolerance**. By default, it is set to 20. If it is increased, it will replace colors that are slightly lighter, darker or shifted. For example, the same color choices, with a tolerance of 50, will cover some of those other yellow areas.



As good as it might look, if you zoom in, you will see that some pixels were still not replaced.



What can we do? Maybe increase the **Tolerance** further? Let's set it to 100 (the range goes up to 200). Let's see if we can cover all those yellow pixels.



Although all the yellow pixels have been replaced by pink, notice another region (the back wagon) has also changed color. It was green, but a lighter color, so with a higher **Tolerance**, more shades and colors will be replaced.

At the start, two main shades of yellow were present. With the **Color Replacer** tool, the resulting color does not take those shades into consideration. If you want to keep those shades separate, you might need to use separate settings; one for the lighter yellow to be replaced by a lighter shade of pink (or whatever other color you want). For example, you could get something like this:



## Can you use the Color Replacer tool on photos?

As you saw, the new color will be solid and will not have any shading. A photo will most likely have lots of shadings or hue variations, even for the same "color". As you can imagine, using the **Color Replacer** on a photo will make it pretty "flat". Let's look at this photo.



Let's replace the yellow column with pink.



As you can see, the result is less than brilliant! That is the type of result you can expect when using the **Color Replacer** tool on a photo. Not the best, I would say.

## A few tricks when using the Color Replacer tool

You know that you will get the best results on a flat design, with well-defined colors and areas. Here are a few tricks you might like to try.

**Double-left-click** on one area of the color you want to replace, and ALL the pixels will be replaced; you won't have to brush everywhere for that.

**Right-click** to replace the Foreground color by the Background color

**Double-right-click** and it will replace all the colors on the layer as with a single right-click.
