Description

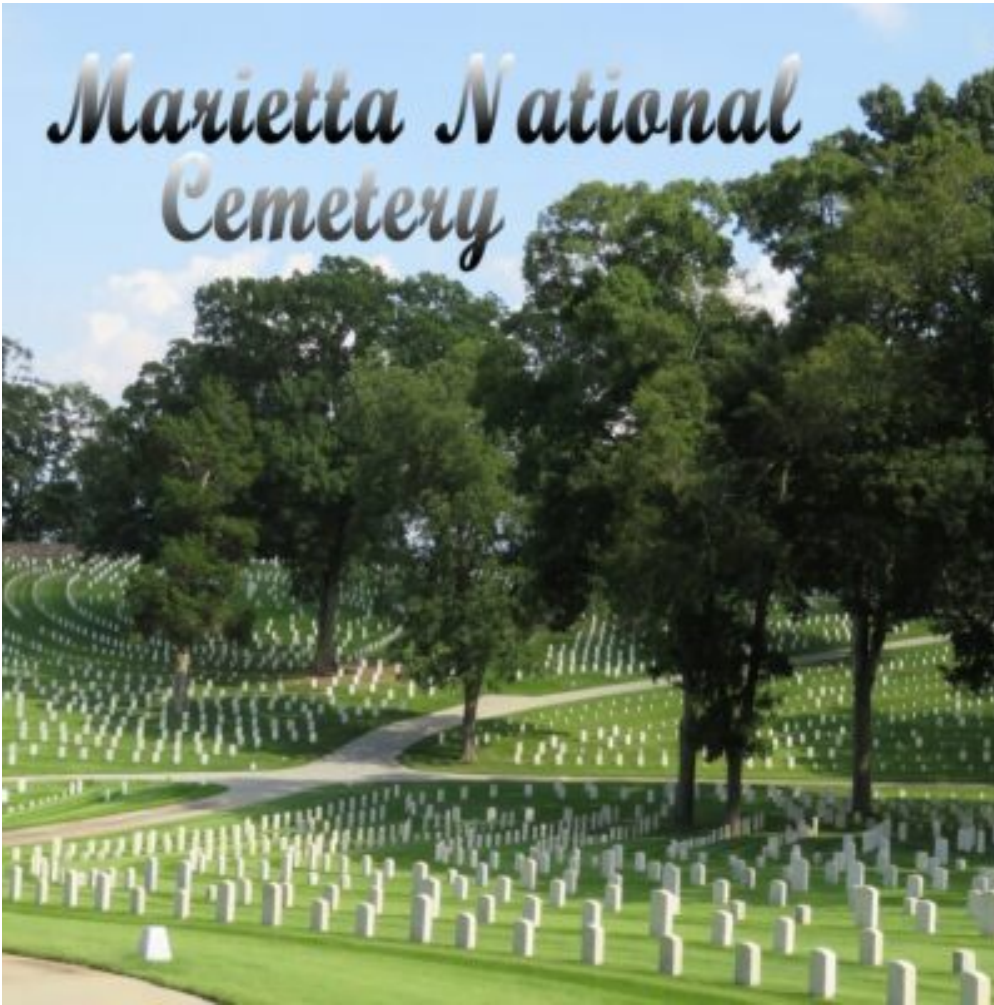

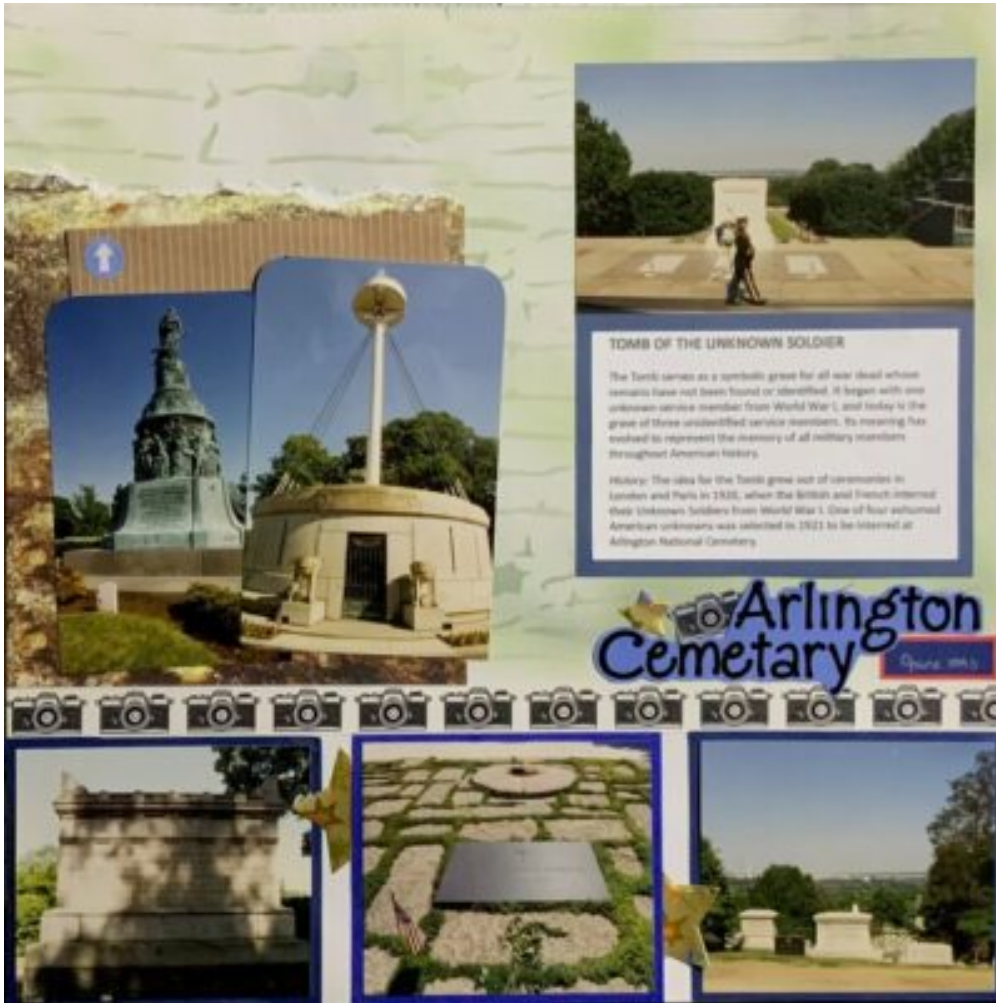

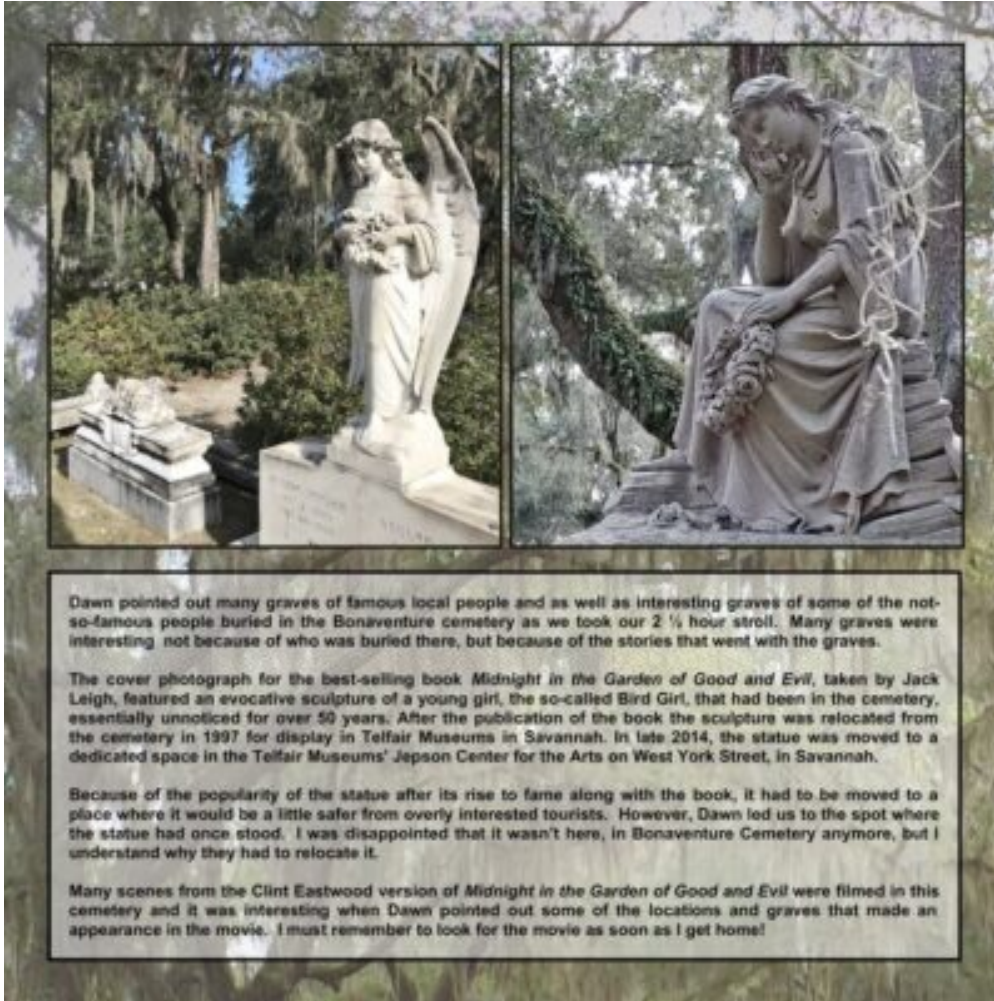


Savannah Georgia

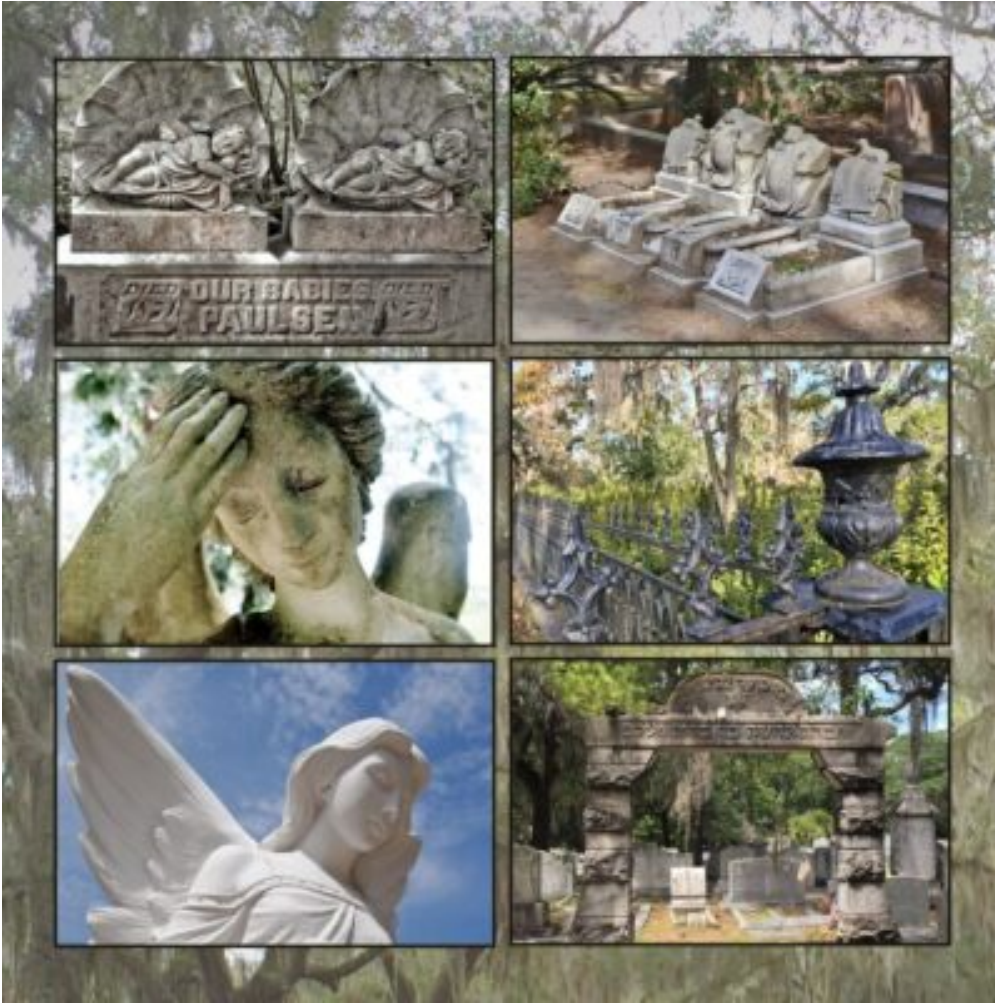
Bonaventure Cemetery 2019

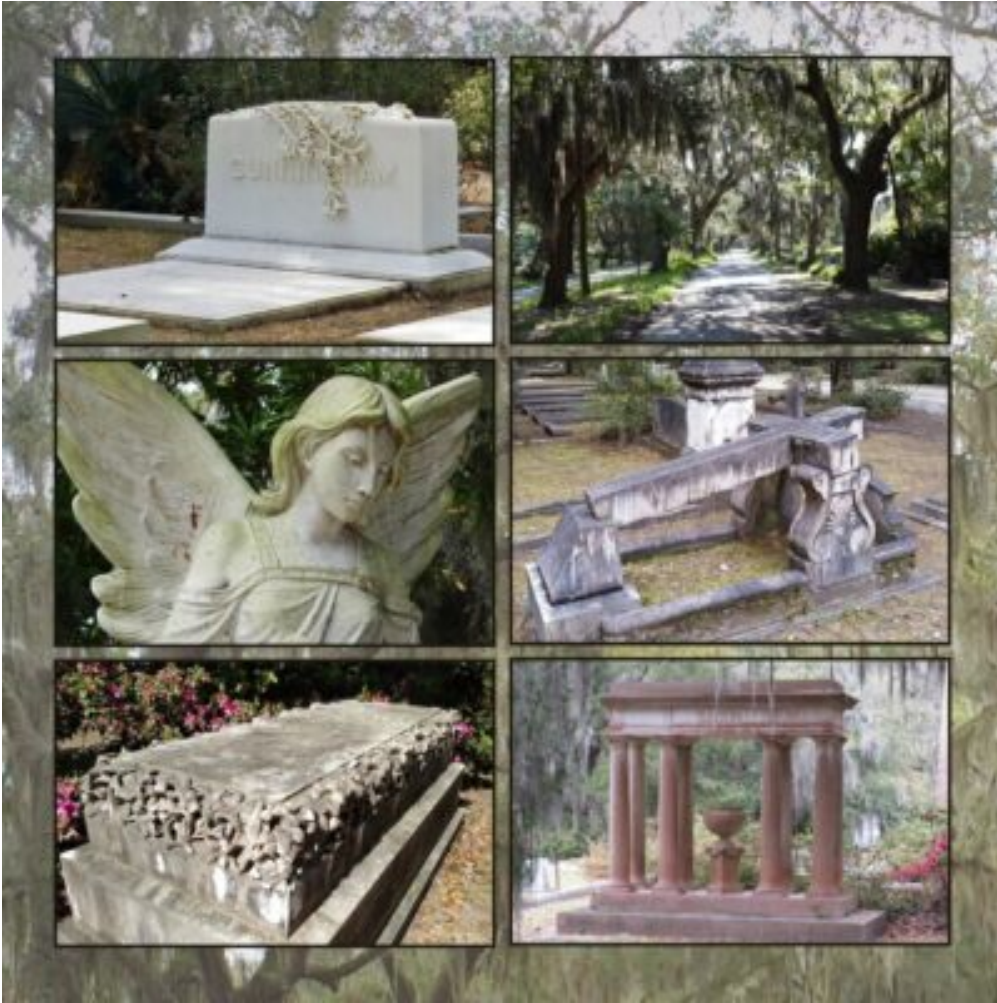

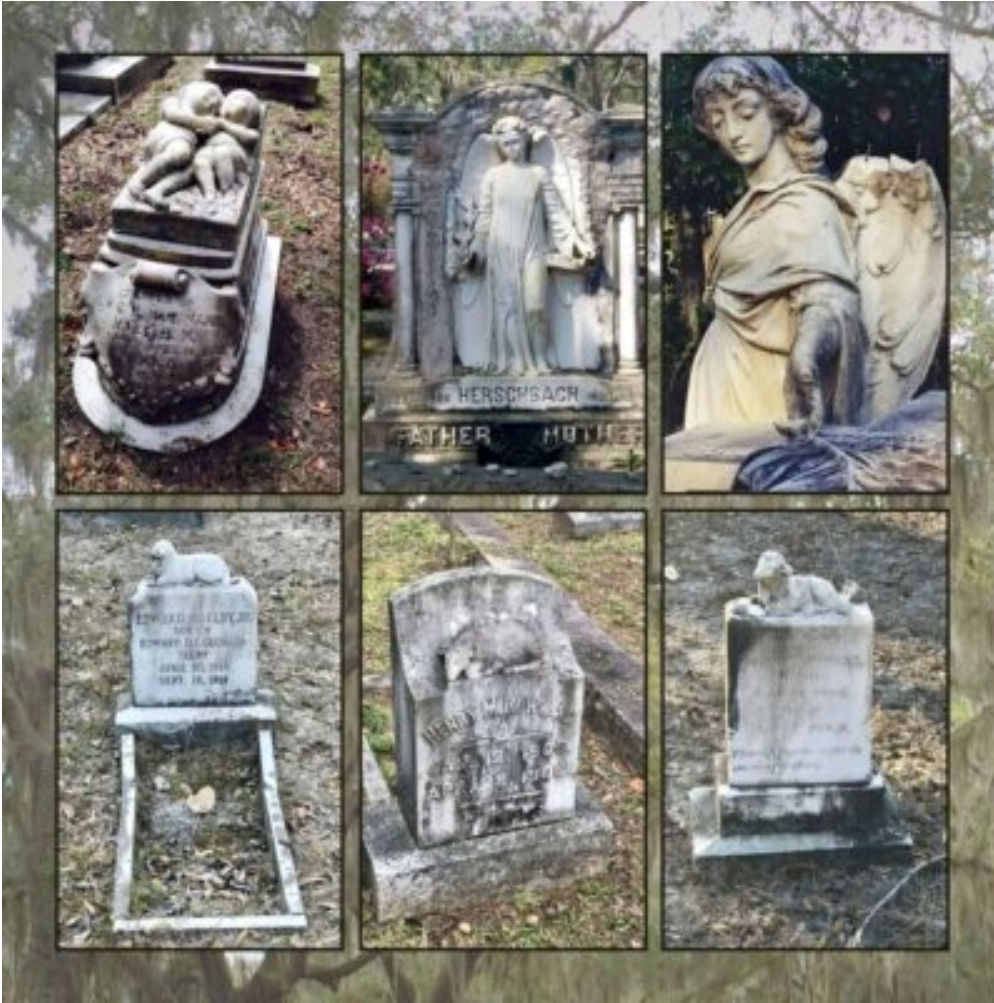

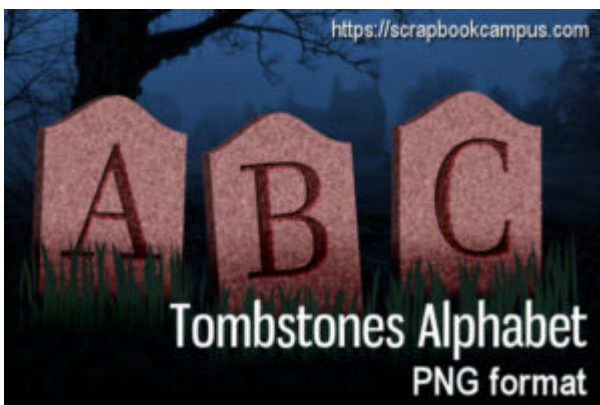
